- Learn new vocabulary.


students will:


Students will begin to develop knowledge of the origins of literature through studying a range of Greek myths. They will learn about the following figures in Greek Mythology:

Students will also read The Odyssey and write a description based on Ancient Greece.



- Write their own dystopian story







Students will study 'Pygmalion' to develop their knowledge of drama texts and conventions. They will also:

- Write a speech based on the topics from the play






A study of women in literature who are not stereotypical for the time period of the text. Students will read and study extracts from the following texts:



Pre 1914 Literature Gothic

Year 9 begins by studying a Gothic classic by author Mary Shelley. Students will read 'Frankenstein' and learn how Shelley creates sympathy for the monster. They will also:

- Learn about different narratives
- Learn about Gothic conventions
- Discuss and Debate science and religion
- Write their own Gothic story

Pre 1914 Poetry The Romantic Era



Building on their knowledge of the Romantic Period, students will study a variety of poems from the following poets:


- Percy Bysshe Shelley

Year 10 marks the start of pupils' GCSE journey and we start with a study of 'Great Expectations.' Pupils will:

- Explore how Dickens presents themes of love, loss, injustice and the class divide

Power and Conflict Poetry

Political control



Building on their knowledge of poetry from Year 9, students will study the following poems, thinking about how poets present political control in their poems. Students will study:

- Ozymandias Percy Bysshe Shelley
- London William Blake
- Storm on the Island Seamus Heaney
- Checking Out Me History John Agard
- The Emigree Carol Rumens

Students will study 'Macbeth,' they will learn about:

- How Shakespeare presents Macbeth as a tragic hero
- How Shakespeare warns us about problems with going against God's laws
- How Shakespeare uses symbols and images to help us to understand characters' feelings

Shakespeare Tragedy

English Language Paper 1 Students will read a range of fiction extracts and will learr how to:

- Analyse why writers have chosen to use specific words, phrases and devices and how they structure their texts to interest us
- · Evaluate how effective writers are
- apply their knowledge of descriptive writing from KS3 to produce extended descriptions

- Explore how Priestley develops characters and creates conflict in the family

Year 10

Year 11 starts with our study of how writers present their viewpoints and building on knowledge of how to present viewpoints in writing. Students will:

- Analyse how writers use language and rhetorical devices to present their views
- Apply knowledge from KS3 to create convincing arguments on a wide range of topics



Building on students' study of 'Great Expectations' and 'Macbeth' in Year 10, students will apply critical theories to these texts. They will learn about:

- Feminist criticism
- Freudian interpretations
- · Post-colonial analysis
- Cristian interpretations



Students will study a range of poems that they have not studied before and explore how the poets use words, devices and structure to present ideas

Unseen Poetry

Power and Conflict Poetry Power Imbalances Students will continue studying Power and Conflict poetry) exploring how poets present their ideas about power imbalances. Students will study:

- Extract from The Prelude William Wordsworth
- My Last Duchess Robert Browning
- Kamikaze Beatrice Garland
